What is the ARDFC?

- Canadian affiliate of the Anglican Relief and Development Fund (ARDF)
- ARDFC is the global aid arm for our Diocese and, with ARDF, for our Province
- ARDFC's board is chaired by Bishop Charlie Masters; ARDF's by Archbishop Foley Beach



The Anglican Relief and Development Fund Canada – or ARDFC – is the Canadian branch of the global aid arm for the Anglican Church in North America. We work closely with the US-based, and much larger Anglican Relief and Development Fund.

Our work is done in partnership with Anglican dioceses and ministries in the Global South... where we are helping these churches be the ministering hands of Jesus in their needy communities.

Careful stewardship

How we select projects

- Global South dioceses propose projects
- Projects are vetted based on criteria including impact, viability, financial controls, leadership, and sustainability
- Global South Primates - who are ARDF Trustees - select projects



Our ministry is led by the leaders of the Global South.

They propose the projects

Research is then done to ensure the projects will be effective and are in keeping with good stewardship

Then, with the help of these research reports together with their knowledge of the priority needs in the Global South, Primates sitting on ARDF's Trustees Council select the projects for which we will fundraise.

Proven trusteeship

Proven trusteeship

From 2010 to 2016...

- ARDFC completed 9 projects on 4 continents totally \$447,600
- And raised more than \$185,000 to bring relief in 11 global disasters



In our first 8 years, ARDFC has raised nearly \$450,000 to fund 9 projects on 4 continents. In addition, we have sent more than \$185,000 dollars to help relieve suffering in 11 different crisis situations around the world.

As you can see, ARDFC is still rather small – but we are grateful for a growing base of faithful donors who allow us to expand our ministry.

So while we are small, ARDF, our US partner which launched 6 years before we did, has raised and invested millions and completed more than 150 projects.

Together, we have won the confidence and respect of Anglican Communion leaders throughout the Global South.

- Our first project was a malaria prevention project in **Kenya** working with the Diocese of Maseno West
- In 2012, we did two projects, both involving micro-finance for women. These were in **Peru** and in **Burma** (or Myanmar)

- We've also completed a project in **Congo** helping returning refugees get re-established on their land with livestock, tools and seed.
- In 2013, we worked with the Diocese of **Recife** in Brazil to build a training centre for use in training evangelists. The centre also offers both academic and vocational training to people in their surrounding low-income community.
- Then we took on the first of our **South Sudan** projects. The first was to build a pediatric ward for an incredibly effective clinic in the Diocese of Yei.

- In 2015, we were able to provide clean water in the Diocese of **Wau, South Sudan** by funding the drilling for 3 deep bore holes.
- This was followed by a farming project in **Burundi** designed to lift people out of abject poverty and subsistence farming.
- Our most recently completed project was helping the ACNA church plants in **Cuba** by raising funds to purchase a second-hand van to facilitate their ministry. (Even second-hand vehicles are surprisingly expensive in Cuba thanks to the trade embargo and high tariffs.)

2017-18 project - Cameroon

Building a clinic to provide affordable healthcare in Douala, Cameroon. Goal: \$89K

Our current project is our most ambitious yet.

We are partnering with the **Anglican Diocese of Cameroon** to provide a full-service **healthcare clinic** in the city of Douala. It will offer inexpensive, quality care to people who do not have access to, or who cannot afford, health care and medications

The clinic will be operated by the Diocese, which is part of the Church of West Africa, and is expected to provide care to about 1000 patients each month. The Diocese will ensure that patients have access to affordable care as well as hear the Good News of the Great Physician.
