Update on the Cameroon clinic project for affordable healthcare

Cameroon, on the Gulf of Guinea, is a Central African country of varied terrain and wildlife. Its inland capital is Yaoundé, and its biggest city, the seaport Douala.

ARDFC has committed C \$ 85,000 to the Diocese of Cameroon for the construction



of a health clinic to be named the Anglican Help Clinic. 48,000 peoples' lives will be impacted. Cost per beneficiary is very low at C \$1.70. We have already raised and transferred C \$ 65,000. This has enabled the Diocese to start construction which is expected to be finished by the end of this year.

We need to raise another C \$ 20,000 by the end of June to assure continued

construction. Who can give? Who can pray?



This wonderful medical facility will provide outpatient services, hospital rooms, medical equipment and dispensing of medicine. The facility will include an outpatient department, diagnostic center, pharmacy, 12 hospital beds, and a surgical theater.

The diocese

will also ensure that patients and their families hear about God, the ultimate healer, through the care provided by Christian health professionals and in the theater. The diocese under Bishop Dibo Elango will provide oversight of the project, which will be managed as a separate ministry with its own financial accounting. The diocese is providing the land.

Thailand Boarding House Programme for Externally Displaced Karen Children

Many of us take for granted the freedom to travel and freedom to work. Others have



learned to take for granted that they are unable to do so. Thousands of refugees from Myanmar have lived confined to the camps in Thailand for over 30 years. Although refugee camps are hardly natural places to live, thousands have been born in the camps and never left. For the vast majority of them, the only way of life they have ever known is one forced to be dependent on outside

assistance. As other refugee situation have had media attention, the plight of this group has largely fallen off the radar.

The Anglican Church in Thailand (part of the diocese of Singapore) has for many years



been working with the Karen Anglican Ministry at the Border among the refugees. This ministry operates 6 boarding houses. The students live and study here. They come from villages and within Myanmar will only see their families on school holiday. Some are orphans, others are from poor families who cannot support their schooling. This is where the Anglican Church provides them with

accommodation, food and caring in Christ's love.

The Anglican Network Church of the Good Shepherd, Vancouver has supported the boarding house programme for many years. This is about food, shelter and education. It is now facilitated through ARDFC. This is a wonderful story where a parish has brought this project to ARDFC, then made a commitment to take on the full amount. The whole congregation has rallied around the project and is raising the full amount of C \$ 40,000 over a period of 25 months. Thank you Church of the Good Shepherd, Vancouver.
